Preliminary Report of Archaeological Excavations at Hayatabad, Peshawar: Field Season 2018

Abstract: This report is the second in the series of Hayatabad excavations conducted in three consecutive years (i.e. from 2017 to 2019). Accordingly, it is related to field activities carried out in 2018. During these excavations, we opened new trenches in which new smith workshops were exposed. Of these, one yielded a multi-phases workshop known from four stages of a rebuilt crucible and furnaces at different levels of occupation. The most fascinating feature of this season of work was the discovery of a burnt granary consisting of two compartments. There we found numerous storage pots arranged in L-shape alignment and other pots lying upside down in dumped and compressed condition due to the collapsed timbers of ceiling. This work also unearthed mud and stone structures always found built in grid pattern. In other finds, copper coins including a small hoard, animal and human figurines, stone and terracotta beads, stone pestles, iron objects and ceramics are also reported. Hence new evidences confirm the previously proposed occupation periods at the Hayatabad site known from 2nd century BCE to the end of 2nd century CE.

Introduction

The Department of Archaeology, University of Peshawar, conducted further excavations at the same site at Hayatabad (Peshawar) in summer 2018. These field activities took place in mid-April, which continued for three months and hence concluded in mid-July. As described in our previous excavation report, the site is located at the entrance of Phase-V, Hayatabad (Peshawar) (Khan *et al.* 2019). On the Google Earth map, the site can be located at the coordinates 33°59'42.66"N and 71°26'30.06"E. It is adjacent to the left of main Torkham Road leading to Afghanistan and further connected with western, southern and northern routes.

In view of the location and condition of the site, and fascinating discoveries of the previous excavations, the Department of Archaeology resumed work at the same site for the second season in 2018. This year excavations were carried out with the same spirit under Professor Ibrahim Shah, Chairman of the Department of Archaeology. The field team remained the same led by the principal author/investigator supported

by Mr. Muhammad Naeem Bacha (Surveyor-cum-Draughtsman), and M.Phil and Ph.D students. For this successful campaign, we would like to extend our debt of gratitude to Mr. Humphrey Sarfaraz Peters, Bishop of Peshawar, for his generous help and support, and to Professor Sara Safdar for her kind cooperation. They not only granted us permission for their valuable land but also encouraged our field activities. Excavations

This year the team selected adjacent area with the previously exposed trenches including an old trench AI/18 which was not fully excavated. In view of this plan, excavations were carried to the east and west of the area excavated last year. According to plotted map of the site, we conducted our fresh excavations at the following trenches:

AI/9, AI/10, AI/14, AI/15, AI/19, AI/20, AI/24, AII/6, AII/11, BII/11, AI'/9, AI'/14, AI'/20 & AI/18.

These trenches were exposed one by one and sometimes diggings were carried out simultaneously at different locations. The trenches located to the east of our previous excavations were AI/9, AI/10, AII/6, AI/14, AI/15, AII/11, AI/19 and AI/20 including previous season unexcavated trench AI/18. Besides this, three trenches were also laid to the west of the last year excavations. A large trench 10x5 metre was selected as isolated in BII (Fig. 2).

We began our excavations from a single trench at AI/14 (Pls. 1b, 2a & 2b). After removing the topmost layer, we found a circular furnace, stone anvil and a number of wall stones. Some stones were found lying in proper orientation and some randomly. After removing unsystematic stones, there we found a circular column like structure (1 metre in diameter) made in several courses, which continued to the bottom level of the trench (Pls. 8a-c). In the course of excavations, we found a very hard and compact level at southwest corner which perhaps used as floral level because ashes, charcoal bits and few bone pieces were lying scattered over there (Pl. 5a). The following layer (no. 3) comprises a thick deposit of soil containing potsherds and other objects. Similar finds were also reported from the following layers. This trench was successfully excavated up the virgin soil for determining levels of different occupations and their contemporary activities. These parameters could also be applied to the process of excavations at other trenches as well. Accordingly, distinguished features of other trenches will be highlighted here.

Along with this, we also started work at AI/19, which is located to the south of AI/14.

Just below humus layer, a stone wall lying in the east west orientation across the trench unearthed in the centre (Pls. 3b, 4a). In this way, the wall penetrates the trenches situated to the east and west. It is a straight wall of single course with a width of 60 cm. A fragment of stone wall at the north-south orientation is connected to the south side of this wall, which is further extended to the adjacent trench AI/24. These structures obviously belonged to the late period at the site as only their foundation levels survive in the upper strata. To the north of this structure, two circular furnaces, semi baked clay crucible and broad base of quenching pot found side by side (Pls. 3b, 4a-b). These evidences suggest another compartment of workshop established in the late occupation (i.e. the Kushan period) at this site. Some burnt soils with compact surface unearthed to the other side of the same structure but without any significant features. The composition of the remaining layers is the same as highlighted in the description of the previous trench.

In pursuance of the long stone-wall exposed at AI/19, we started work at AI/20. The wall under discussion also continued in the same orientation in the new trench (Pls. 4a, 5b). It comes from the west trench and penetrates into the south-east corner perhaps also persistent in the next trenches as well. It usually occupies the southern part of the trench and confined to the upper strata. Some evidences of mud-brick wall traced out, which is almost parallel to the stone-wall but near the west section it turns towards north at right angle. This structure found at the lower layers which seems earlier than the stone-wall built in the upper layers. This wall is badly disturbed due to the recent past sceptic tank dug out in this area (Pl. 6c). In view of this disruption, our excavations did not reach to the lowest level of the trench.

In view of square plan we selected new area i.e. trench AI/15. This trench is located to the north of AI/20 and east of AI/14 (Pl. 5b). With the start of first layer, L-shaped stone structure was exposed that goes down deep into the virgin soil. It is a long-sophisticated wall of four courses built in the north-south orientation, which turns toward the west on the north side (Pls. 9a-b). To the east of this wall, a number of fallen stones and a circular

furnace with stone anvil unearthed together. The stone anvil is remarkable due to its huge cuboid shape accomplished with fine trimming and smooth surfaces (Pl. 21a). After removing fallen debris, we found mud-brick structure with three sidewalls built on the east, north and south sides. On the west side it is supported by stone wall lying in the north-south orientation (Pl. 10b). According to this layout, it was a perfect small compartment in rectangular shape made during the earliest period (i.e. Indo-Greek) of the site (Pls. 19b, 20a). The most fascinating discovery made at the following layer (no. 4) when burnt soil, ashes and timbers found together. Above this deposit first we unearthed a cooking pot and then a lot of burnt activities were noticed when we removed this pot (Pl. 7b). Near the east wall of mud bricks, a large hollowed bird figurine with a terracotta wheel below it found in the burnt deposit (Pls. 17e-f). This thick burnt deposit was obviously a fallen material of ceiling collapsed due to fire incidence. It is interesting to see that everything lying below this level were left intact and never re-excavated and cleared out for later occupations. Below the burned level, we found a cooking pot covered with flat stone slab and another small pot filled with ashes used as burning chamber for this purpose (Pls. 20a-b, 21a). Further north in the same trench, we found a large storage pot and a deep pit filled with ashes (Pl. 23a). These ashes were carefully removed for which this pit was made in virgin soil (Pl. 22b). Similarly the large storage pot filled with soil was successfully dug out which laid buried in the virgin soil. Inside this pot a curved lid fallen into it was also recovered.

After this, we opened a new trench at AI/9 (Pl. 8a). After removing the topmost layer, we found many stone walls coming from west and east trenches. Accordingly, two parallel walls of double courses lying in east-west orientation appeared in the west side where they were the parts of compartments previously found in AI/8. In this trench, these walls are fallen in the middle and discontinued towards further east. A narrow stone-wall of double courses lying north-south was also found in the upper strata where it is connected with another wall coming from east side. Hence their southwest corners make

L-shaped structure of the compartment. The east-west structure contained four courses built over virgin soil is earlier than the north-south narrow structure (Pl. 9a). The size of wall and its stone blocks are bigger than the previous one. Along the north side of this wall i.e. inside the room, a quenching pot and a circular furnace were found side by side (Pls. 12a-b). Both components are known from layer-2, which obviously belonged to late phase of the site (i.e. Kushan level). Apart from this, a large storage vessel unearthed inside the south-west corner of room which further sunken into the virgin soil (Pl. 12b).

A trench AI/10 was opened for investigating the extension of stone-walls going towards south and east directions, already exposed in AI/9 and AI/15 (Pl. 8a). A junction of stone-walls of two courses made in different sizes forms the eastern portion of rectangular compartment. Its western part lies in AI/9 where the above features of workshop were exposed. Accordingly, this rectangular chamber was used as workshop during the late phase of the site (Pls. 9a-b, 10a).

In pursuing the burnt evidences previously exposed at AI/15, an adjacent trench AII/11 on its east was selected for further investigations (Pl. 10a-b). The composition of the first two layers remain unchanged as we have experienced in former trenches. The most distinguishing feature of this trench is the collapsed form of burnt ceiling over granary. Below this level was uncovered a thick burnt deposit comprised of ceiling timbers like beams and rafters lying in east-west and northsouth orientation often crossed at right angles (Pl. 23c). This deposit contained a lot of ashes, which was carefully removed step by step. Just below these debris, six large storage vessels were found in L-shape, which were well arranged in the alignment of northeast corner of the room. Of these, four pots were found against the north mudbrick wall and the remaining against the east wall (Pls. 16a-b). These pots were installed according to the layout of compartment and erected on the level of natural soil. Due to the pressure of fallen structure, these pots were uniformly broken at their shoulders. In this way the upper portions of these pots vertically penetrated into their lower bodies (Pls. 16a, 17a, 17c). The lower bodies seem

to have been partially buried inside the ground as compact soil was found around them. Some of these storage vessels yielded charred beans (both round and oblong) and one has a small bowl inside it. The adjacent area was also occupied with a variety of pots of different sizes where some pots were lying at their original place, but many found in upside down position (Pls. 15a-b). A row of small pots containing bowls and dishes unearthed at north-south orientation against the western wall. Most of these pots reported in upturned position perhaps had been fallen from a shelf when the fire incident was happened (Pls. 16a-b, 18e-f). Some pots of this row are intact or slightly damaged. Few ones bear evidences of decayed small grains. One broken painted pitcher is reported from the centre of the trench towards south direction (Pl. 19b, no. xxv, Fig. 17, no. 132). In view of number of large pots with grain deposits and variety of other pots the two compartments divided by a narrow mud-brick wall in the centre obviously utilized as granary (Pls. 19b, 21b). It is very important to find the context that this structure was built during the Indo-Greek period and perhaps collapsed during the late phase of the Indo-Scythians but never reopened and reconstructed in the late phases of the site. This area was abandoned permanently and thus everything left intact in their original

A new trench AI/24 was opened in the south alignment of AI/19. We carried out work in this trench step by step and found some evidences of a workshop (Pl. 26c). A stone base of quenching pot unearthed besides stone-wall. This stone-wall lying in north-south orientation is fragmentary and perhaps connected to the large wall exposed in three trenches (AI/18, AI/19 and AI/20).

We resumed work at trench AI/18, which was left unexcavated just below first layer of the site (Pl. 27c). Stone-walls of a rectangular room exposed during excavation in layer-2 (Pl. 27b). These walls are well made and went down to the virgin soil. These walls are of different width and sizes and mostly composed of five courses (Pl. 28b, 29b). Some walls overlapped one another in the same orientation (Pl. 28b). A long wall with one or two courses foundations coming from east side built over the north side wall of the room.

This wall and west wall of the room which is also of a single course are corresponding to each other. Underneath these structures, four walls of the room are contemporary and obviously belonged to the early phase (i.e. Indo-Greek) of site. This is the only room which contains four stone walls and floor levels in perfect condition. In this room we found three circular furnaces, one stone anvil and crucible which rebuilt in four phases (Pls. 29a-b). All features of this workshop belonged to the early period. The reusing and rebuilding process of this semi-baked clay conical crucible is interesting:

- a. The first crucible was made on virgin soil as the flat-topped foundation stone was inserted into the natural soil of the site and then the 24 inches conical structure of crucible is erected over it (Pl. 30d).
- b. In the second stage lower body of the previous crucible is slightly filled with lumps and then square stone with flattopped foundation stone is placed and its upper structure went parallel within the conical body of previous one. The walls of this crucible are thin and slightly taller than the first one as it was mostly built within old one (Pl. 30c).
- c. The crucible of third phase is similarly made within structures of previous two crucibles. But the base of this crucible is made of thick mud lumps. The inner side of the lower body of this crucible is furnished with small bits of terracotta, which is semi-baked and thus provide a very hard surface for the crucible (Pl. 30b).
- d. In the final stage, foundation wall of the 3rd phase was retained but repaired and coated with the same material as used in the previous one (phase-3).

This crucible was made near south-east corner of the trench. It inclusively gives an effect of a vertical pile of bowls placed one above the other e.g. the upper one retained within its lower one, the latter within the below and similarly the second last within the bottom of the lowermost one (Pl. 30a). It indicates that this workshop had been in active use for a long period of time. Its early

period definitely goes back to the Indo-Greek period and the later to the Indo-Scythians. A stone anvil associated with this multi-stages crucible is in rectangular shape with flat-topped surface was also fixed against the east wall. The furnaces were established slightly towards west side of the room.

In the meanwhile a detached trench located in BII/11 was marked for excavation. It was a test trench, bit larger than the others, intended to discover the perimeter and lay out of the cultural deposit (Pl. 31c). After removing humus layer, a iunction (corner) of stone-walls uncovered. These walls set at north-south and east-west orientation and meet at right angle. To the north of wall a small hoard of six copper coins unearthed. These coins were lying scattered on the floor level in one place about one metre space. Two days later, one more copper coin was also recovered from the same area but picked up fifteen centimetre down the previous level. Apart from a hoard treasure, cultural deposits and living activities were limited, thus we abandoned our excavations in this trench.

In pursuance of fire incidence occurred in granary at AI/10 and AII/6, one more trench to their north at AII/6 was selected for excavations (Pl. 22a). This trench did not yield significant findings as it was already partly levelled for the construction of modern drain for industrial waste. However, at the lower levels (layer-6) two small pits were discovered lying one above the other. These pits were filled with broken and some complete terracotta pots and ashes (Pls. 31a-b). The last pit was retained just above the virgin soil. It yielded some interesting pedestalled cups, bowls and dabber. They seem to have thrown material as these pots found haphazardly with ashes.

Besides this core area of excavations, we also undertook some work in three trenches located to the west of our previous excavations. These trenches, as mentioned earlier, were marked as AI'/9, AI'/14, AI'/20. The landscape, layout of walls, furnaces made for workshops and result of finds observed in these trenches were thoroughly consistent and uniform (Pls. 24a-b & 31c). One long stone-wall of three courses was uncovered, which belonged to the early period of site. Some portions of east-west orientation mud-brick walls seem connected with the stone wall. Workshop

features such as circular furnaces, base of quenching pot and stone anvils are also reported. All these features corresponded with the strata of upper levels hence belonged to the late period of the site.

Structures and other Features

The simple wall structures and infrastructures set up for smith workshops remained the same as described in the preliminary report of our previous excavations (Khan et al. 2019). Two types of masonry (mudbricks and stone-walls) is reported and often made in two stages of constructions. The stone-walls are known in two sub-types, (a) the broad walls of many courses usually belonged to the early period of the site and (b) the narrow walls of double or single course often overlapping the previous one belonged to the late phase of the site. The stone-walls of the early period look intact and sophisticated in structure. The stone-walls of the late period usually represent foundation of the late structure and often overlaid structures of the previous period. The most obvious example in this context is noticed in trench AI/18 where a rectangular chamber for workshop was constructed during the early phase. In the later period, another stone-wall of the late period was raised over it on the long wall of the north side, which runs parallel to it. Similarly its tributary wall on the west side is slightly east of the previous one but erected in the same orientation. All the four walls of the early period are intact, well made and lying underneath the upper structures or about the same alignment. It is also noted that the room size of the early period looks smaller than that of the late period although orientation of the wall remained unchanged (Fig. 3).

The mudbrick wall, usually narrow in structure (30 cm wide), confined to the early period i.e. Indo-Greek level (Pl. 22a). The overlapping tradition of mudbrick walls of the late period over the early period is not known or collapsed due to the fragile nature of substantial. The mudbrick walls usually founded at the granary area where three side walls including a partition wall of the two compartment and southern enclosure or large room in front of these rooms were constructed of this material. After this, the frequent use of

mudbricks is reported from a group of three trenches undertaken to the western end of the site. But these trenches are unable to reveal clear plan and layout of mudbrick structures.

One element of the stone structure reported at AI/14 is new and not known in previous excavations. It is a circular column made of several small stone courses (Pls. 8a-c. 9a). Its foundation was made over the virgin soil and obviously belonged to the early period of the site. The existing top of this structure was reused like a stone platform in the later period as smith furnace, stone anvil and other stones spread at the same level were found side by side. Another circular or semicircular structure or platform was found in AI/18 (Pl. 28a). Half of this structure or a complete semi-circular structure is exposed along with north section while the remaining portion seems penetrated into the balk between this trench and AI/13. It is reported in layer 4 with no other relevant feature in the same vicinity.

Furnaces and Workshops

Eight smith workshops were exposed during previous season of excavations marked in serial number from W1 to W8. In continuation of this. six more workshops were unearthed this year, which can be designated with similar number from W9 to W14 (Fig. 3). The workshops of this site were usually equipped with four elements i.e. furnace, crucible, quenching pot and large stone anvil. These four elements are rarely found intact at one place. Last year criteria i.e. retaining of two elements in one place or within one enclosure will be applied for the formation of a single workshop. However, some workshops contained more than one furnace. In these workshops, we traced out eleven furnaces, four quenching pots, two crucibles and four stone anvils (Pls. 25a-f, 26a). All quenching pots are reported in fragments and merely their bases somehow found in complete form (Pl. 3b, 25e). All furnaces were exclusively made in circular shape, which mostly retained the same diameter of 30 cm as recorded last year. The conical crucibles are represented by two examples, one is simple known from the upper strata and the other made in multi phases from lower layers (Pls. 29a-b, 30a-d). Similarly four stone anvils are

known in different shapes and sizes. These anvils bearing broad flat top were made in rectangular and oval shapes. As described in our previous report, these arrangements were made for smith workshops.

Workshop 9 (W9)

This workshop spread over two trenches i.e. AI/9 and AI/10. It was set up in a small rectangular chamber (Pls. 9a, 12a-b, Fig. 3). A base of quenching pot and a circular furnace were found side by side although this part of trenches has been disturbed due to erosion and cutting of edge for industrial drain. These features of the workshop including the enclosure walls existed in the upper strata obviously belonged to the late period of the site. The southern wall seems to have been built over the early period as the late period wall overlapping it in the same orientation while the other three walls slightly narrow in width erected in the late period. One storage pot is also found from the same area but it belonged to the early period as its lower body was implanted in virgin soil.

Workshop 10 (W10)

Located in the adjacent trench AI/14, this workshop (W10) was also found in the upper strata and hence contemporary with the previous one (W9). The existing features comprise a circular furnace, a large stone anvil and a stone platform nearby top surface of stone column (Pl. 8a, 13a, Fig. 3). On the south and east sides it is bounded with stone-walls. The remaining were fallen or disturbed due to recent activities on the surface of the mound.

Workshop 11 (W11)

This workshop has been preserved in AI/15 and located to the east of W9. It also lies in the same orientation. It is identified by a circular furnace with ashes and charcoals and a large rectangular anvil (Pl. 21a, Fig. 3). Some scattered stones were also found near anvil perhaps arranged for a platform which were found in other workshops too. The stone anvil is interesting and slightly different from others by its huge size, straight

sides and flat-topped surface. These features were found in rectangular chamber enclosed within stone wall on its west side and mud-brick walls on the remaining three sides. All these walls seem to be of early period as they were erected during the early phases of occupation where granary had been collapsed long before the construction of this workshop. All these features unearthed in the upper layers and hence contemporary with the other two workshops (W9, W10) traced out in the same vicinity.

Workshop 12 (W12)

This workshop is reported from AI/19 and seemingly arranged in a sequence following the row of W9 and W10 in north-south orientation. It is also known in the upper strata and hence belonged to the late period (i.e. the Kushans) of the site. This workshop yielded two circular furnaces, base of a quenching pot and small crucible without stone base (Pl. 3b, Fig. 3). It was bounded by a courses stone-wall of two courses on its south and mudbricks wall on east sides. The stone-wall was obviously contemporary while the mudbrick wall of the early period.

Workshop 13 (13)

This is the most intact and well preserved workshop of the site so far known from the excavated area. It is the only workshop of the present excavations that belongs to the early period of the site (i.e. Indo-Greek). This workshop is marked by three small furnaces, an oblong stone anvil and a multiphases crucible (Pls. 29a-b, 30a-d, Fig. 3). The stone anvil installed between the crucible and a furnace all arranged in a row against the east wall of the chamber. The multi-phases crucible, as described above, was reused after renovation and repairing in the same place. As a result of these arrangements, the level of crucible was gradually raised according to the surface of the existed ground. This workshop was built within small rectangular chamber unearthed in AI/18 trench and found in the west alignment of W12.

Workshop 14 (W14)

This workshop is reported from the west zone

trenches located at AI'/9. It was exposed in the upper layers that apparently belonged to the Kushan period. This workshop is characterized by a circular furnace, a crucible filled with earth, an uneven stone anvil and a base of quenching pot (Pls. 24a-b). All features of this workshop are known in frail and poor state of preservation.

Apart from this, circular furnaces of the same nature are reported from adjacent traches like AI'/14 and AI'/20 too. The remaining features of these workshops seemingly damaged due to their placements in upper strata which have been levelled and disturbed for the construction of industrial drain.

Small Finds

The outcome and occurrence of small finds is almost the same as we experienced in the previous season of our excavations (Khan *et al.* 2019). These objects include toilet tray, copper coins, terracotta human and animal figurines, beads, iron finger rings, blades and sickles, stone pestles and grinding tools and numerous pots and potsherds.

Of these the discovery of a steatite toilet tray is fascinating, and remarkable piece of art occurred at the small archaeological site in Peshawar. It is slightly broken and portrays an erotic scene of the Greek antagonistic couple 'Satyr and Nymph'. Being companions of Dionysus, these two figures frequently depicted with other figures known in various relief panels of Buddhist art (Tanabe 2020). The discovery of this particular theme from the site under discussion is an important piece of evidence of the classical Greek art because it is not known from proper provenance in Gandhara before this. However, toilet trays of different themes are well reported from Sirkap (Taxila) but not known none of them from other major sites like Shaikhan Dheri (Dani 1963-64) and Aziz Dheri (Nasim Khan 2010) of the same period sites in Gandhara region.

Like the previous year excavations, the terracotta human figurine usually of female are few and often unearthed in broken condition. Stylistically, they are the same as those of baroque lady found in abundance at Shaikhan Dheri and Taxila. In animal, bull figurines are common:

some complete while others broken. Broken horns of these figurines are also reported. One hollow figurine of a stylized bird with a hole at the top for receiving small stone and whistling and a cross hole at base for wheels and a small hole across beak for string was used as toy. As described in the catalogue, one terracotta wheel of a pair was also found underneath it. Apart from this, one more fragment of a hollow figurine is also reported.

Like our previous excavations, beads of different varieties are unearthed from the present excavations too. These are known in stones, paste, glass paste and terracotta. Of these, one schist bead is enormously larger in size but only half is preserved and engraved with pair of zigzag lines. In terracotta, most of the beads are plain but the bicone shaped pieces are often decorated with geometrical pattern. The conical and pot-shaped beads usually applied with a heavy collar at top. This year, short bicone with central notched band are also known in good number.

Fragments of bangles are known both in glass and shell material. They are plain and often made in rectangular section. The shape and occurrence of this material are not different from the previous results. One cowrie shell and half-broken antimony rod of shell are also known from the present excavations.

Like the previous year, the result of finger rings is almost the same and all known in iron. Of these two are intact and remaining in fragments. In other iron objects, varieties of hooks and rods, arrow heads, clamps, sickle-blades, bracelet and large size clever are reported. Two sickle-blades are excavated intact and one was attached with a small nail for hafting. Apart from this, iron lumps are also known particularly picked up around workshops area.

Among other objects, stone pestles and pounders are known in large quantity. They were made in different sizes and varieties like barrel, cylindrical, elliptical, ovoid, cuboid and round shapes. They always bear marks of utilizations at their ends and sides. Most of them are reported complete and few are also known in fragments.

Four grinding stones are also known from current excavations. They are mostly long bars with flat topped or slightly curved surface. Of these, one is complete with shoulders at both ends remaining are in half pieces. The bottom sides often inserted into floors are rough and uneven.

Similarly, we found reasonable number of sharpeners. Naturally small flat sided stones of different shapes were used for this purpose where the surface of utilization can be identified by its smoothed exterior. Sometimes both sides were used for the same purpose.

A large number of small round stones, some seem trimmed from outer edges are also collected. These pieces are known in different sizes and weight and perhaps used as weight cubes for weighing small objects. Like previous excavations, this year too we found a stone ring (doorpost) of the same design perhaps used for revolving the door.

Pottery

The response and results of pottery were almost the same as we had experienced during the last year of our field work. This year, we also found a large number of pots and potsherds. The pottery of this site bear close similarity with that of properly excavated sites such Sirkap (Marshall 1951; Ghosh 1947-48), Shaikhan Dheri (Dani & Sehrai 1965-66; Hussain 1980) and early levels of Aziz Dheri (Nasim Khan 2010) and Damkot (Rahman 1968-69). The general features of these ceramics remained the same so there is no need to repeat them all in the same manner. The most significant feature of the present collection is novel varieties of some intact and broken pots unearthed at the burned granary. The pottery of this site is usually known in red colour but grey ware also collected. The grey ware is normally represented by few sherds of drinking bowls, pedestalled cups and a small pitcher. This type of pottery is plain but one body sherd, perhaps of pitcher, bears denticulate pattern on its shoulder. The link of this category was earlier established with the Indo-Greek and the Indo-Scythian periods (Dani & Sehrai 1965-66: 136-38).

The red ware pottery is known in a wide range of types from small pots to large storage jars. The surface scheme of such pottery also varies from fine smooth to roughened and crude exterior. Besides main assemblage of pottery, three dabbers are also recorded. Of these the intact dabber is reported from a pit area unearthed in lowest layers (6) at trench AII/6. Apart from other pot sherds, this pit yielded some fine examples of pottery such as a pedestaled cup and a long drinking glass. This pit was found buried in two stages; the upper one included a terracotta long glass, broken bowls and a pedestalled cup (Pl. 31a), the lower comprised complete pedestalled cup with black paintings and dabber (Pl. 31b). No pit of this nature is reported from this site.

A noteworthy group of complete pots are found at granary, a burned chamber located in trench AII/11. These pots are known in different types, sizes and shapes. This particular group of pottery included a painted pitcher, storage jars (often broken), dishes, serving and drinking bowls, short pedestalled cups, medium and small jars. In view of their deposition in the lower level, such assemblages obviously belonged to the early phase (Indo-Greek) of this site.

One large storage pot picked up from the lowest layer further penetrated into the virgin soil. It came from a room located to the west of granary in AI/15. It was filled with soil and its lid found inside it which was fallen due to the collapsed deposit of upper strata. It is in bulbous shape with sloping walls and a plain cordon applied round shoulder. The rim was slightly damaged and with except few cracks it is almost intact. Due to the context in which it was installed apparently belonged to the Indo-Greek period.

The painted pottery is few but interesting. One pitcher is decorated with a variety of designs: rim depicts parallel lines, base of neck blobs, the upper register round shoulder star and plant motifs and the lower register bears hatched triangles and other designs. One fragment portrays animal motif in stylized pattern. Other sherds decorated with floral and geometrical designs. One small sherd is decorated with wheel design. The broad flat rims of pedestalled cups, usually of the Indo-Greek period, painted with triangles, hatched triangles and parallel lines. One pedestalled cup is painted with small leaf pattern. The inner base of a pedestalled cup, like previous season, painted with butterfly or floral motif.

The shoulders and rims of some large serving bowls, pitchers and dishes often decorated with denticulate and series of wavy bands. The shoulders of some storage pots are strengthened with cordons which bear a variety of geometrical designs such as wavy lines, cross bands and oblique lines. The inner bases of dishes are sometimes also decorated with floral design and circles. Similarly, shoulders of small vessels are decorated with pair or series of grooved lines.

Apart from these categories, large number of pot fragments are known in the form of rims, pedestals, bases, handles, spouts, knobs and other parts. The forms, size, texture, fabrics and other features of such pottery reveals the nature, scope and utilizations. The general features of such parts are the same as those elaborated in the previous report of our excavations. Like the previous work, the pottery is likewise classified into groups and varieties and highlighted with images and drawings of some selected specimens.

Periodization

In the 2017 excavations, nine copper coins were recovered from different layers. These coins greatly helped to establish the basic periodization of the site. Of these, one coin belonged to the Taxila-Pushkalavati series, two to the Indo-Bactrian-Greek, four to the Indo-Scythian and two to the early Kushan periods. In view of these evidences, the occupational dates of the Hayatabad site ranged from 2nd century BCE to the beginning of 2nd century CE (Khan *et al.* 2019).

During the present season of excavations, we found eighteen copper pieces including a hoard of six coins. The twelve coins picked up from different layers in various trenches. The hoard deposit was found scattered within one metre square area on the floor level. This deposit came from the upper strata at trench BII/11. According to the context, the hoard belongs to the late period of the site. All coins of the present excavations are reported in rusted condition but sometimes designs were traceable on them when unearthed. Somehow the coins were recognized from their shapes and size as well. Later, these coins were sent to the Central Laboratory of the Lahore Fort,

Government of the Punjab, for proper cleaning and treatment. We are thankful to Malik Maqsood (Deputy Director) and Irshad Muhammad Sumro (Chemist) for their help and support. Apart from one example, the remaining coins of the present excavation are legible for understanding the sequence and chronology of the site. The coins are summarized in the following chart and description.

Inview of the results of the previous excavations, the new collection of coins not only confirm the chronology of our previous excavations but they precisely delimitate the initial and terminal periods of the site. These coins are generally assigned to three major periods (Chart-A); (a) Bactrian-Greeks, (b) Indo-Scythians and (c) Kushans. The first period is known by three coins, the second also by three coins and the third by twelve coins. The coins of the Bactrian-Greeks belonged to the two kings i.e. Eukratides-I and Antialkidas. One coin of Eukratides-I was also reported from previous excavations. All coins are square in shape and executed in uniform design portraying helmeted bust of king on the obverse and mounted Dioscuri on the reverse. This piece of numismatic evidence confirms the rule of this king in the Peshawar valley. The rule of this monarch is usually known from 171 to 145 BCE. The single coin of Antialkidas is in better condition depicting the bust of Zeus on the obverse and palms and pilei of Dioscuri on the reverse.

All coins of the Indo-Scythians exclusively belonged to the reign of Azes II, the last ruler

of this dynasty. The rule of this king is generally placed during the last quarter of 1st century BCE. The coins reported from the present excavation are uniform in their design showing bull figure on the obverse and lion on the reverse. One coin came from the second layer in AI'/14 and remaining two from the hoard deposit. These coins are legible but known in poor state of preservation. The results of Azes II coins of the current and previous seasons are alike and issued in full denomination of Indian weight standard. This type of Azes II coins were obviously issued from Gandhara region and widely circulated in the Peshawar valley.

During the previous excavations, two coins of the Kushan period were reported from this site. They were assigned to the first two rulers of the dynasty. This year, the result of the Kushan coins is promising and more comprehensive but no coin of the founder king (i.e. Kujula Kadphises) is clearly evidenced. The uncertain coin may be associated to the reign of this ruler but it is just an assumption. Looking to the general trend of finds, the coins of Kujula Kadphises are not commonly found in the Peshawar region. Like previous excavations, one coin of Wima Taktu, the second ruler of the Kushans, is also known from our present excavations. The site also yielded one coin of his successor, Wima Kadphises. His successors like Kanishka and Huvishka are represented respectively by five and four coins. Four coins of Kanishka are of full denominations of main mint and one of quarter denomination of Kashmir and

Hazara mints. The obverse design of all these coins is uniform depicting standing figure of king at altar to left and reverse known with the figures of Miiro, Oado and four-armed Oesho. On some coins, the reverse figures are not clearly visible.

One coin of Huvishka is of heavy denomination, which portrays figure of king seated cross-legged on obverse with uncertain deity on reverse. The remaining three coins of this ruler issued in reduced weight and the obverse display king riding on elephant to right. The reverse of one coin is somehow clear, exhibiting a female figure (perhaps Nana) standing to right. The reduced weight coins of Huvishka belong to the second phase of the main mint. Of these, two coins belong to the hoard deposit. This numismatic evidence obviously indicates that the site was abandoned during the late phase of the reign of Huvishka (CE 155-191).

The characteristic features of terracotta figurines, variety of small finds including art objects, bead pieces and pottery etc. as described above and explained in the catalogue also support the proposed sequence and chronology of the site. These phases of occupation can also be confirmed with antiquities and other features reported from contemporary sites in Gandhara and the surrounding region.

TOILET TRAY AND SAUCERS

Steatite Toilet Tray

It is made of steatite with grey core and brownish smooth surface. Its shape is round, partly broken, flat, extended rim with parallel incised lines, portraying erotic scene of the Greek antagonistic couple Satyr (male) and Nymph or Maenad (female). The female figure, seated frontally with

legs turned back, has long bushy hair combed back, small nose with chubby cheeks, wears bracelet and short skirt, while remaining body seems naked and pushes the chin of the bearded male figure with her both hands who is seated in her lap. The male figure is naked, has curly hair, snubbed nose and large ears and wears thick bracelets. He is seated in the lap of the female figure as described above, seen in profile looking up with large open eyes to the face of the female figure, his right arm goes round her and seduces her for love making. This type of scene was widely developed in different varieties in Greek art.

One similar example of toilet tray (acc IS.236-1960), reported from Gandhara and now preserved in the Victoria & Albert Museum (London), also depicts the naked figure of Satyr with Nymph (Francfort 2015: 322-23). Stylistically, the V&A example is different from the toilet tray under discussion as it portrays the female figure in the lap of male figure where the latter is keeping to remove her hand from his chin (https:// collections.vam.ac.uk/item/O65344/ornamentaldish-ornamental-dish-unknown/). This piece of Greek art justifies its own significance for the archaeological context reported from the site of Hayatabad in Peshawar, the heartland of Gandhara. Other related material unearthed at the same site such as terracotta human figurines, fashion ware painted pottery and coins of the Greco-Bactrian rulers issued during the 2nd century BCE further strengthens the validly and position of the Greek style toilet tray in the existing chronology of the site.




Figure 2. Layout of the existing site and the excavated area in 2017 and 2018




Figure 3. Plan of structures and other archaeological remains






