Late Kushan Copper hoard (?) from the collection of S.R.O¹ in Directorate of Archaeology and Museums Khyber Pakhtunkhwa

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Abstract

The coins registered under the accession no. S.R.O 2764, along with thousands of other coins and antiquities were received in the Directorate of Archaeology and Museums Khyber Pakhtunkhwa after the Eighteenth Constitutional Amendment of Pakistan. The current paper represents the first batch of the coins after its proper documentation and cataloging (001-213) containing 20 examples of Vasudeva I, 139 of Kanishka II, 41 of Vasishka, 12 of Kushano-Sasanian imitations and a single illegible coin. These coins itself were confiscated at Peshawar airport and therefore it cannot be claimed that it for sure was a hoard however the chronological sequence and continuity in the types suggests that it probably was a hoard which was deposited at the time of Vasishka somewhere in the Peshawar valley, the ancient Gandhara.

Remarks

The hoard represents the last phase of Kushan rule in Gandhara immediately before the Kushano-Sasanians conquered the region during the reign of the Kushan king Vasishka and the Kushano-Sasanian king Peroz I.

If the chronology of the Kushans is based on Falk's fixing of the first year of Kanishka I to c. AD 127, then the probable date of the conquest of Sasanians is about AD 260, late in the reign of Vasishka (c. AD 247–267).

External corroboration of the date of the conquest around AD 260 comes from the inscription of Shapur I, the Sasanian emperor of Iran (AD 240-270) inscribed on the Kaʿba-ye Zardosht at Naqsh-e Rostam in Fars, Iran after c. AD 262 (dated by its reference to the capture of the Roman emperor Valerian in AD 260, and by the rule of Hormizd, Ardashir as king of Armenia from c. AD 262; Huyse, 1999). In this inscription Shapur I states that his empire includes the Kushan kingdom as far as Peshawar. The king's death in AD 270 marks the date before which the inscription was written and therefore

before which the conquest of Peshawar took place. This hoard contains none of the coins issued by the Kushano-Sasanian king Peroz I in his territory south of the Hindu Kush, nor of those issued by the Kushan kings Kanishka III or Vasudeva II who succeeded to the Kushan throne after Vasishka, therefore its deposit should be dated before the conquest by Shapur I, but after the accession of Vasishka, c. AD 247. Allowing enough time for the Vasishka copper coins in the hoard to be issued suggests that the hoard was deposited several years after Vasishka's accession in c. AD 247, therefore the date of the hoard should be c. AD 260.

Vasudeva I

Copper unit, c. 9-8g (GRK types F3–4)

Obverse: King wearing tall crown and armour, full figure standing facing left, halo before head, holding staff in left hand and making offering with right hand at small altar, surmounted by a trident, inscription in Bactrian: *Shaonanoshao Bazodeo Koshano*.

Reverse: Oesho, Kushan god of mountains, full figure standing facing in front of bull,

left hand holding trident, right hand holding diadem, tamga in right field, inscription in Bactrian: *Oesho*.

The Vasudeva I coins in the hoard are all worn and slightly underweight, consistent with the length of time they were in circulation. The only discernable variety among them is the *nandipada* symbol in the right field variety (GRK type 4b), issued late in the reign. The other examples may also be of this variety or of other varieties, but they cannot be identified because of their condition.

Kanishka II

Copper unit, c. 8-6g (GRK types G1–2)

Obverse: King in tall crown, overcoat over tunic and leggings, full figure standing facing left, halo before head, holding staff in left hand and making offering with right hand at small altar, surmounted by a trident, inscription in Bactrian: *Shaonanoshao Kaneshko Koshano* (rarely legible).

Reverse: Ardochsho, Kushan goddess of good fortune, wearing Greek dress, full figure seated facing on throne, with coins round her feet, tamga in left field, inscription in Bactrian: *Ardochsho* (rarely legible).

The Kanishka II coins vary considerably in quality of design. At the beginning of the reign the coinage was well designed and consistent, with two main varieties. distinguished by the presence of a Brahmi or Kharoshthi control mark, vi, in the right field. The design quality of Kanishka II's coinage deteriorated through his reign and the hoard contains many examples of these deteriorated examples. The attribution of Kanishka II's copper coins is largely based on their close similarity to gold coins with his name (G541-554). The use of Brahmi vi on gold coins overlaps with the reign of Vasishka (G556), so it remains a possibility that the

later deteriorated copper coins continue into Vasishka's reign.

Vasishka

Copper unit, c. 7-5g (GRK type H1)

Obverse: King wearing tall crown and armour, full figure standing facing left, halo before head, holding staff in left hand and making offering with right hand at small altar, surmounted by a trident, inscription in Bactrian: *Shaonanoshao Bazeshko Koshano* (normally off flan, only occasional letters detected).

Reverse: Oesho, Kushan god, full figure standing facing in front of bull, left hand holding trident, right hand holding diadem, tamga in left field or missing.

The Vasishka copper coins are distinguished from the coins of Vasudeva by their cruder style, lower weight and by the bent form of the king's left arm (Vasudeva I's coins have the king's left elbow bent at right angles). Their inscriptions are rarely visible and never complete. The Brahmi control mark *chu* in the right field is not present on all coins. It link these coins with gold issues made in the reign of Vasishka (G559–568).

Kushano-Sasanian Imitations

Copper unit c.7-5g (GRK F*1–2)

Obverse: King in tall crown, overcoat over tunic and leggings, full figure standing facing left, halo before head, holding staff in left hand and making offering with right hand at small altar, surmounted by a trident.

Reverse: Oesho, Kushan god, full figure standing facing in front of bull, left hand holding trident, right hand holding diadem, tamga in left field or missing.

The imitations are distinguished from contemporary Kushan coins, by the

combination of the obverse design of Kanishka II, i.e. king wearing overcoat, together with the Oesho and bull reverse design used by both Vasudeva I and Vasishka. The obverse design lacks a readable inscription, but is distinguished from its Kushan prototypes by the addition of symbols, a swastika before the king or under his arm, or a triangle under the king's arm, sometimes accompanied by another symbol (a swastika, another triangle or three prongs). After the period of this hoard further imitations continue to be issued, dropping in weight down to about 3g.

The attribution of these imitations to the Kushano-Sasanian conquerors is based on their use of the same swastika and triangle symbols as the gold imitations (G676–698) of Vasudeva I issued in Bactria after the Kushan-Sasanians conquered it from the Kushans at the end of the reign of Vasudeva I. The imitation coppers in this hoard should be dated to the period of the reign of

Vasishka as their weights are based on the standard used by the Kushans early in his reign, c. 7-5g. The imitations were issued in Bactria, so their penetration into Vasishka's territory represents the phase of Kushano-Sasanian issue before the last years of Vasishka's rule in Gandhara.













